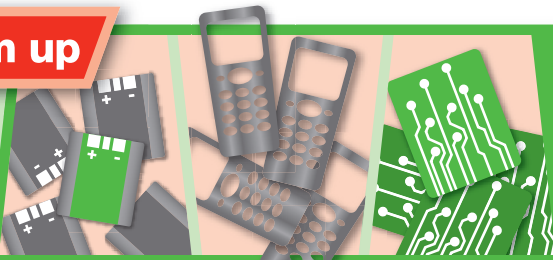

What happens to recycled mobiles?

Most people buy a new phone around every 2 years. More than 52% keep their old mobile phones, resulting in over 16 million used mobiles being stashed away in cupboards and drawers at home and work.

1 Break 'em up



Batteries Plastics Circuits

All mobiles collected by MobileMuster are dismantled, sorted and separated into circuit boards, batteries, handsets and accessories. More than 90% of the materials in mobile phones can be recovered.

2 Metals are extracted



Plastics are shredded



Gold Silver Copper

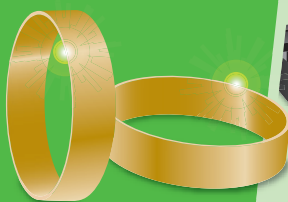
One tonne of circuit boards can yield about the same amount of precious metals as 110 tonnes of gold ore; 123 tonnes of silver bearing ore and 11 tonnes of copper sulphide ore.

Batteries are sorted by type for cadmium and nickel recovery

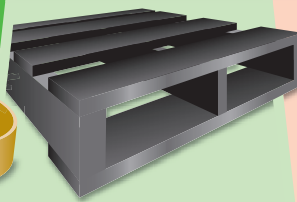

The materials recovered can be used to make batteries, fence posts (Cyclone Composite Posts), jewellery, plastic pallets and stainless steel. All mobile phones handed into MobileMuster are recycled.
